

Ride Reports

BAM '87

Friday, September 4 I traveled to St. Louis in preparation for Bicycle-Across-Missouri (BAM) 1987. Prior to this I had never ridden farther than 200 miles at one time, but while participating in the Quad Cities Bicycle Club Double Century in June, one of the other riders encouraged me to try BAM. I had the necessary mileage base, so I decided to try it.

At 6:00 a.m., Saturday, September 5, 160 riders started en-mass. Approximately ten miles into the ride we encountered the first clue as to how the local residents viewed BAM; it appeared that large amounts of used motor oil had been poured on the road, and approximately 30 riders experienced flat tires due to carpet tacks that had been spread on the road. I picked up two tacks and had to change the front tube.

One hundred and sixty miles into the ride I was back into the top 20 and Dave Tanner (from Bloomington, IN) and I started riding together. I was riding without a support vehicle, and although Dave had a support vehicle, it had dropped back to support two other riders (a husband and wife team also from Bloomington) that were going slower than him. We rode together into the night - Dave still wearing his sunglasses, since his regular classes were in his support vehicle.

We were just outside the top ten when we reached the turn-around point at 12:00 midnight. At approximately 3:00 a.m. we met Dave's support vehicle, and he was able to put on his regular glasses at last. 6:00 a.m. (24 hours) found us approximately 350 miles into the ride. Dave was getting sleepy and my feet were getting sore. Sunday was a long day with Dave having constant problems with diarrhea and me very definately having "hot foot." By midafternoon Dave started feeling better and our pace picked up.

Editor's Page



Here is another in a series of information about bike trails. Keep in mind that these trails are open all year, so if you aren't a cold weather biker you can use them for cross country skiing or hiking. We are fortunate to have so many trails available to us, most within a few hours drive.

Cedar Valley Nature Trail

This nature trail is located between Waterloo and Cedar Rapids, Iowa. It was developed on 52 miles of the abandoned Illinois Central Gulf railroad. The route goes through the Cedar River bottomlands, along forested banks of the river and rolling farmlands, where young trees are punctuated by open vistas.

This trail has the distinction of being the longest trail in the country that links two metropolitan areas and is the only nationally designated bike trail in Iowa.

As with the other trails, the surface is chipped limestone and is designed for comfortable touring or hiking. As quoted in the brochure, "Leave nothing but foot (bike or ski) prints; take nothing but pictures. The development of the trail was made possible by private donations, help from the Iowa Natural Heritage Foundation, federal Land and Water Conservation Fund and the Iowa Legislature, which appropriated \$130,000 from a bequest of Glenn Grover Herrick.

Some towns you will pass through are - La Porte City, Gilbertville, Brandon, Urbana, Center Point, Cedar Rapids, Hiawatha and Marion. There are many accommodations and points of interest along the way.
