I was amazed to find out that the state of Iowa lists Duck Creek as a class "A" swimming water for all of its length through Bettendorf and most of its length through Davenport. It is also listed as a class "B" fishery all the way to its beginning How long do you think that will last? Even with the best

Dear Mr. Langan:

I wish to thank you very much for your most generous contribution, in the name of Milan H. Fritz, to our investigative program concerned with malignant brain tumors. The Division of Neurological Surgery continues with an active laboratory concerned primarily with the investigation of primary malignant brain tumors. We now have the capability of growing these tumors in tissue culture and are able to study the molecular characteristics of the abnormal tumor cells. We are also continuing aggressive management of these primary malignant brain tumors. Although there has been some success with prolongation of life, we are far from achieving a clinical cure at this point.

## February 16, 1990, MACKINAC ISLAND

Last fall, Mary Ellen and I visited Michigan's famous Mackinac Island It is a 15-minute boat ride from Mackinaw City docks. The cost is only \$8 per person. This includes hauling your bike. We started from the visitor's center and rode the island shore road. This paved road around the island is eight miles. It is level, uncongested, safe and easy for young and old. There are many interesting sites along this road -Arch Rock, Chimney Rock, Lover's Leap, Devils Kitchen, to name a few. We cut inland at the British landing site. This is hilly but worth the trip. 

It's come to our attention that because there are new club officers and probably new club RAGBRAI chairpersons we should restate the ground rules for the passes we have set aside for your group for the 1990 ride. Although these guidelines usually are republished annually, we did not include them in the letter you received last month.

So, here they are:

- 1. These wristbands can go only to members of your club.
- 2. These people <u>must</u> have been members of your club prior to January 1 of this year.
- 3. Club members who obtain wristbands through your club are expected to use your club baggage service or put their baggage on our truck. We don't want them bringing vehicles on the ride.
- 4. Club members who do not obtain wristbands/passes through the club will have to go through the regular drawing process.
- 5. If your club provides a charter service, it is the responsibility of the club to make sure that no one is accepted for the charter who does not have the necessary wristbands. No wristband, no ride.
- 6. Clubs are responsible for the conduct of all minors included in their group. Non-member minors who are part of the charter MUST be accompanied by a parent or adult relative.
- 7. If a club has more wristbands allotted than members need, the extra wristbands will be retained by the RAGBRAI office for distribution through the drawing.
- 8. We hope you will encourage club members to order the package of Register Souvenir editions.

Don't forget that we must have the name, address, age and telephone number of each person in your club for whom you are requesting wristbands. For our own file we would also like to have a roster of your club members. If you have questions, please call 515-284-8282.
